
Message



Gurdwara Janam Asthan Baba Budha Sahib Ji

Baba Budha Ji was born here on 6th October, 1506 and this is one of the most venerated places in Sikhism. He was born to Bhai Suggha and Mai Gauran and lived for over 100 years. Gurdwara Janam Asthan Baba Budha Sahib Ji is a high walled complex on the Amritsar-Batala road with a massive langar hall, a congregation hall, a sarovar and rooms for devotees. It is said that Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji met him as a young boy grazing buffaloes and due to his innate wisdom, named him Budha (old and wise one) despite his young age. He was a devoted follower of six of the 10 Gurus, initiated the guruship of five of them, oversaw the construction of Sri Harmandir Sahib, was appointed the first priest of Sikhism's most sacred shrine, and he also supervised the building of the Akal Takht. This Shrine is splendidly illuminated on Baba Budha's birth anniversary, every year in October.

Gurdwara Nanaksar Sahib Ji

This pilgrimage centre located in block Chogawan, District Amritsar, is associated with Sage Valmiki. Sita is said to have sought refuge in his ashram before giving birth to Luv and Kush. Guru Nanak Dev Ji visited the place with His devoted travel companions. It was here that Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji exposed an imposter priest named Baba Mikke Shah who used to deceive people for money with the promise of enabling them to see God. Guru Nanak Dev Ji and Bhai Bala hid the priest's kamandala while he was meditating. When the priest opened his eyes and started looking for it, Guru Ji questioned him as to why he could see God but not his kamandala. The Gurdwara is located in Kaler village near the turn for Ram Tirth.



Gurdwara Ber Sahib

The village Dharamkot, where the white marble Gurdwara stands, has found fame when Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji came here to interact with Shah Bakhtiar, a Muslim fakir, to understand other religious and spiritual beliefs. It is here that the two holy men exchanged their thoughts and ideas on spiritual matters, while Guru Ji stayed here for two days. The ber tree on the premises is believed to have been planted by Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji himself. Now the tree is waving almost as high as the structure of the Gurdwara Ber Sahib.



Sathiala is the resting place where Guru Ji stopped on his journey from Sultanpur Lodhi to Gurdaspur. He set up camp by the village pond, and there He sang and preached to a large gathering. One of the women from gathering came and placed her unwell child at His feet and Guru Ji directed her to bathe the child in the pond. The child's health was restored and soon the child became healthy again. Since then, the pond became renowned for its curative powers.

Gurdwara Nanaksar Sahib

Medieval monuments, shrines, mosques and dargahs dot Saurian village in Amritsar. Built on the banks of the Saki Nullah that flows through Ajnala, the village and its streets speak of a rich, ancient and spiritual history. Gurdwara Nanaksar Sahib commemorates His stay here en route Dera Baba Nanak. He stayed here in a one room structure where He debated with Pathan Ubarey Khan and his spiritual master Sheikh Mallo. It was converted into a large Gurdwara Nanaksar Sahib in 1986. Some accounts say that both Khan and Mallo were convinced by Guru Nanak Dev Ji's philosophy and ideas and eventually, they became His followers.

Gurdwara Thamm Sahib

Udoke Khurd was the marital home of Bibi Isri, the youngest daughter of one of the Guru Ji's most ardent devotees. He had promised her that He would visit her and years later, He stayed there for nine months and 26 days. He spent his time preaching his compositions and giving discourses near a wall on the outskirts of the village. When He was about to leave, the villagers asked for some remembrance and He offered them a thamm (a wooden support) used to hold up rafters in his dwellings as a symbolic gesture of continued support and protection. The wooden log is still there and a gurdwara was built around it.

Gurdwara Ber Sahib is situated in Village Veroke, Ajnala, District Amritsar. Within the Gurdwara compound are sprawling trees almost as high as the complex itself. These are said to have descended from the ber tree that sprouted from the log of wood that Guru Ji once sat on with Shah Bakhtiar, a Muslim fakir, as they discussed the philosophies of other religious and spiritual beliefs.

According to the printed accounts displayed, this Gurdwara commemorates the visit of Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji, Sri Guru Hargobind Ji and Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji. To better understand the spiritual ideology and way of life of resident Siddhs, the founders of faith came to this place. It is said that Sri Guru Gobind Singh named the shrine. As per the records, Guru Nanak Ji visited the place while He was living in the neighbouring village of Chak Fateh Singh Wala for a week. He came to know about a lactating cow, called Laweri in Punjabi, and He protected her newborn calf from wild animals.

The premises of the shrine includes a large sarovar, and a langar hall that is open round-the-clock. Out of all the stories about the origin of the name of this village, it is strongly believed that Guru Ji recited Sri Japji one lakh times while He was here. At that time, this was a thick forested area with lakhs of trees. Sri Guru Hargobind Ji, Sri Guru Har Rai and Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji also visited the place and Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji composed a shabad on his way to Lakhi Jungle.

When Guru Nanak Dev Ji visited village Mehma Sarja, he had chosen a dense forest outside the habitation, for his stay. Afterwards, this forest was named as 'Lakhi Jungle' by Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji which meant 'a forest worth of lakhs.' With the passage of time, a separate village emerged at Lakhi Jungle. At the time of Guru Nanak's visit, it was a part of village Mehma Sarja. Another Gurdwara is also built here in the memory of Sri Guru Hargobind Ji, because he also visited this village.

Gurdwara Sri Akaalgarh Sahib Patshahi Pehli, Chhevi and Dasvi

Guru Nanak Dev Ji is said to have rested in this semi-arid area of Faridkot for a while, on his journeys with Bhai Mardana. Feeling thirsty, the Guru requested Bhai Mardana to get him some water from a saint living nearby on the sand dunes. The saint was lethargic and he refused. He asked Bhai Mardana to wait for his disciples to return. Bhai Mardana returned after requesting him multiple times and narrated the incident to Guru Ji. Guru Nanak Dev Ji went and asked the saint as to why he couldn't get up and give water himself. On hearing the words, the saint feared he'd been cursed and asked for forgiveness. Subsequently, it was also visited by Sri Guru Hargobind Ji and Sri Gobind Singh Ji, and is located beside a large pond in Lambhwali village.



Sri Guru Nanak Ji's week long stay is marked by this Gurdwara in the village of Isherhail. The marble Gurdwara is just off the highway that connects Chandigarh to Fatehgarh Sahib district. It is associated with the stoppage of the ninth Guru, Sri Guru Teg Bahadur Ji on his way from Delhi to Ropar. Later, Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji also stopped here on his way from Patna to Anandpur Sahib. The Gurdwara is named after the theh (mound) next to the pond where the Guru Ji probably stayed.

It is believed that the demon eventually succumbed to Guru Ji's divine and powerful presence.

Gurdwara Guru Ka Bagh Sahib

The beautiful Gurdwara building is surrounded by lush green fields and is located outside the village of Kathiala. A long flight of marble steps leads to the massive langar hall, enclosed by verandahs on all sides. The place commemorates the meeting of Guru Ji with two Muslim mystics, Pir Abdul Rahman and Mian Mitha Siyal. The fields around the Gurdwara were once date palm orchards, where the Guru is believed to have met and debated with the duo. Gurdwara Thara Sahib marks the place where Guru Ji sat and negotiated with the Muslim mystics. It is a small shrine dwarfed by a giant peepal tree and is located right next to Gurdwara Guru ka Bagh Sahib. A brick platform in a recess below the sanctum marks the exact location of their meeting.

Gurdwara Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji Sahib

The Gurdwara commemorates the visit of Guru Ji to Kiri Afghana (also known as Kiri Pathana) in district Gurdaspur near Harchowal to visit a Muslim Pir, Daula Shah. Local tradition state that Guru Ji came here to meet and debate with Daula Shah. The mystic's grave, enclosed in a room, is at a short distance from the Gurdwara. Currently, a larger shrine is being built on the premises and the original flat-roofed structure will be relieved of the role as sanctum when construction will be completed.


The day after his wedding, Guru Nanak Dev Ji along with his wife Mata Sulakhni, stopped at Wadala Granthian. He buried His datun here before leaving and it sprouted the flahi tree that still stands today by the Gurdwara sarovar. The shrine is a low-arched structure with glass panes and a painted representation of Guru Ji's visit beside the tree. On the occasion of the anniversary of Guru Nanak Dev Ji's wedding, his visit here is celebrated with much fervour.



Named after an ancient bohar or banyan tree, the Gurdwara Bohar Sahib built here celebrates the three day stay of the Guru Nanak Ji here. Legends suggests that Guru Nanak Dev Ji stayed here after meeting Nikka Ram, at his Dharamshala, which blessed his ground. Highlighting the sacredness, local legend states that a dead banyan sprouted leaves in 1941 and was witnessed by two villagers, Mull Singh and Amar Singh. Ever since that time, this Banyan tree has been greatly admired.

The gurdwara commemorates an ancient well dating to Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji's time, which he is said to have used. It is strongly believed by the locals that Guru Nanak Dev stopped on the outskirts of the village and was warmly greeted and offered hospitality by the villagers. The gurdwara was built in 1995 and the courtyard encloses a well which is covered by conical iron cage. It is believed that the Guru may have drawn water from the well (Khuh). It is also said that Guru Nanak Dev visited Ludhiana in November 1515.



The gurdwara commemorates the stop that the Guru Ji made in this village while he was on his way to Nankiana Sahib in Sangrur. As per the local traditions, Guru Nanak Dev Ji rested under a peepal tree beside a pond on the thickly forested outskirts of the village, then known as Jhingarh Jagerra. Legends state that after his visit, the village came to be called Nanakpur Jagerra. The gurdwara is located on state highway connecting Ludhiana to Sangrur and is surrounded by orchids. Gurdwara Manji Patshahi Ate Chhevi is also believed to have been visited by the sixth Guru, Sri Guru Hargobind Ji after being released from prison at the Gwalior Fort by the Mughal emperor Jahangir.

Gurdwara Baoli Sahib

The gurdwara was built to honour the Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji's over-night stay at Sodhiwal village, which is also called, Guru Da Dhab. The gurdwara is located in Jagraon's counteryside. In honour of Guru's visit, one of the two Nishan Sahibs is hoisted in front of the gurdwara. The name of the shrine is for the presence of a baoli which has been encompassed in adjoining Sarovar on the premises. A langar hall is also located at the back of the towering, tiled building. A cluster of rooms for visitors and sewadars are also built on the far end of the gurdwara complex. Sri Guru Hargobind Ji followed his footsteps and stayed here for three months. He is believed to have blessed the place, after being pleased with the warmth and devotion of the villagers.



The gurdwara states the four-day stay of Sri Guru Nanak Dev at village Thakarwal on his way from Kiratpur Sahib. Guru rested briefly where Gurdwara Gau Ghat now stands in Ludhiana. Then he continued to Thakarwal and stayed there for few days. The village is said to be named after Mahant Thakur Das who originally belonged to Rajasthan and was initiated into his spiritual mentor's order in Prayagraj. Owing to a battle for succession after his mentor's death, he was left out in the cold. Then he left Prayagraj and established a separate Dera in Ludhiana. Legends suggests that in his meeting and engagement with Guru Nanak Dev, he learnt humility and became his follower.



The gurdwara is named after the sixth Guru, Sri Guru Hargobind Ji, but it also marks the visit of Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji. The visit in this shrine by the Guru Nanak Dev Ji is documented by the presence of sacred things. He visited the rural countryside of Moga, and this has been ascertained by certain objects found here during Kar Sewa (construction) of gurdwara. A Copper Plate bearing the inscriptions of 'Nanak Tapa Ihan Rame' meaning 'Nanak, the ascetic, visited here' and 'Pehli Patshahi Chhemi aae' which means 'The first Guru and the sixth Guru came here' on either sides and a seal with the word 'Nanak' were found. It is believed that these sacred items are held in the archieve of the Sri Harmandir Sahib Ji in Amritsar.





The gurdwara celebrates the visits by founder of the faith and four out of the 10 Sikh Gurus. After the initial visit by Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji, Patto Hira Singh was visited by Sri Guru Hargobind Ji, Sri Guru Har Rai Ji and Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji, and has been made pious due to their visits. The gurdwara is built near a large pond in a quite village. Volunteers found a old handwritten documents describing the visit of Gurus, in 1919 while rebuilding the structure. There are two Kareer trees associated with the Gurus tying their horses with them. To commemorate the 550th birth-anniversary of Guru Nanak, Eco Sikh in collaboration with the citizens of Patto Hira Singh village and the Patto Eco Tree and Landscape Society (PETALS) inaugurated Guru Nanak Bagh, a 5-acre garden on August 20, 2018, under the campaign "550 Rukh Guru de Naam" (550 Trees in the name of Guru) with 13 different tree species mentioned in Gurbani planted on one site.

Gurdwara Nanaksar Sahib

The gurdwara marks the 40-days stay of the Guru, along with travelling companions Bhai Mardana and Bhai Bala at Takhtupura. The current building which is located at the farthest end of the complex was built in 1975. It was built on the spot where the Guru Ji addressed congregations and sung spiritual compositions. Of the multiple shrines located around a central Sarovar, the largest honours the visit of the sixth Guru, Sri Guru Hargobind Ji in 1634. The structure to the right of the entrance of the complex was built in memory of Sri Guru Gobind Singh Ji's visit on his way to Muktsar Sahib after the battle of Chankaur Sahib in 1704.

Chhintanwala used to be known as Mansoorpur then, and a disciple called Chanan Mal Khattri welcomed and hosted the visit of Guru at his home in this village. The door of the hut or chaubara where the Guru stayed is the life-sized antique which has been preserved encased in glass inside the sanctum. The gurdwara has a large Sarovar, langar hall and rooms to accommodate the devotees. Guru Nanak Dev Ji stayed here for 17 days and this stay is important for his recitation rejecting the exclusion of women from religious life. Chanan Mal hosted meal for many priests and scholars in the honour of the Guru and while it was underway, his wife gave birth to a child, resulting in a sutak. As the guests started to leave, the Guru Ji recited a Shabad dispelling the 'impurity' beliefs which is now a part of the Asa Di Vaar and is sung in gurdwaras every morning.







The gurdwara marks the visit of Sri Guru Nanak Dev Ji while he was passing through Sangrur on his journey eastwards. The gurdwara gleams in white in the middle of tropical trees. With a flight of steps leading to it, the structure is awesome sight. The earlier structure was built with lakhori bricks (also called Nanak Shahi bricks), which lent its name to gurdwara. 





Gurdwara Baoli Sahib

The gurdwara is marked as one of the most important Sikh Shrines after Guru Nanak Dev stopped here on his first Udasi, but it was established by the third Guru. The village Goindwal is situated on the banks of River Beas, was once an important ferry port on the Imperial Road connecting Delhi and Lahore. It is said that Guru Nanak stayed here for 3 days on his first Udasi. Bhai Mardana played the rabab, while the Guru sung his compositions. The complex has a covered stepwell (baoli), from where the shrine borrows its name. This baoli is considered the first tirath sthan (pilgrimage) for Sikhs. Concreted with 84 marble steps, the baoli was built to provide rest and water to the increasing number of devotees to the town their Guru called home.
